

EMBARKATION TIME

Embarkation time is 5pm and briefings are held the next morning. You will find your scheduled briefing time in your welcome pack, provided when you arrive at our base. Our office is located down the way on the left from Dive Bar and is a tangerine colored building.



YACHT BRIEFING

Yacht briefings are conducted on the chartered vessel after check-in and chart briefing. The team will give a detailed walk-through of your yacht's technical equipment, information about safe and accurate navigation, including the yacht's navigational instruments, as well as mooring, anchorage and itinerary help. The safety briefing introduces the safety equipment and your yacht's general inventory.

STOP OVERS

For all DYW charters starting and/or ending in the USVIs, the first and last night at the marina is free of charge.

DISEMBARKATION TIME

Disembarkation is at 10am. The team will inspect your yacht's equipment and a general visual check of its interior and exterior. The boat's hull, keel, rudder(s) propeller(s) and /or bow thruster will be inspected by ROV or diver. General inspection will take approximately one hour, depending on size of vessel.

BAGGAGE

Please only take soft bags and not suitcases, as they would be too cumbersome onboard.

HOW TO GET THERE?

ACCESS BY PLANE

Cyril E. King Airport (STT): All major airlines fly into St. Thomas, USVI, daily. There are direct flights from many US cities, but some are only on weekends. Most flights connect through Miami, Ft Lauderdale or Atlanta.

You can also connect through Luis Muñoz Marín International Airport (SJU), San Juan, Puerto Rico, which is the nearest international airport. Several airlines operate flights from SJU to STT, including Seaborne and Cape Air.

TRANSFERS FROM THE AIRPORT TO OUR BASE

If you need organized transfer from the airport, please contact your aftersales team. The current cab fare from the airport to Compass Point Marina is \$130 for a group up to 10 including luggage. We recommend arranging your transfer a few days before arrival. This will prevent you sharing an open-air cab or large van with other travellers where the marina is the last stop.

AREA GUIDE

LOCAL AREA INTRODUCTION

Sailing the Virgin Islands archipelago from our base in St. Thomas offers you the chance to experience one of the world's most wonderful cruising grounds and explore the US Virgin Islands.

The tropical weather with year-round warm temperatures between 75°F and 82°F is perfect for a boat charter. The region is known for its beaches with expanses of powdery white sand, as well as its seven national parks.

The USVIs consist of St. Thomas, St. Croix, St. John, Water Island and many smaller islets and cays. This group of Caribbean islands was discovered by Columbus in 1493 and settled by Spain, England, France and Denmark. In 1917, the islands became a United States territory and while the islanders speak English, the culture is a unique blend of European, American and Caribbean influences.

When it comes to things to do in the US Virgin Islands, you are in luck if you love snorkelling or diving. Sail to the nearby island of St. John which has some of the most beautiful and well-protected beaches in the world. The island is a favourite destination thanks to its lush surroundings, national park and clear waters brimming with sea turtles and rays.

If you want to relax and swim, you will be spoilt for choice for beaches while on your Virgin Islands yacht charter. Popular choices for those exploring by boat include Honeymoon Beach and the beaches along Caneel Bay (formerly Caneel Bay Resort),

Oppenheimer Beach (Hawksnest area), Maho Beach in Francis Bay, Salt Pond and Lameshur.

For seafood, try the Mahi Mahi and fresh tuna when dining out.



TOP THINGS TO DO IN THE UNITED STATES VIRGIN ISLANDS:

- **1**. Explore the National Park, St. John: Take your pick of some of the finest beaches in the USVIs and quiet overnight anchorages.
- 2. Discover Magen's Bay, St. Thomas: Head to this immense mile-long, white sand beach, one of the island's most popular. Make sure you get there early, it's one of our favorite US Virgin Islands things to do.
- 3. Dine at **Zozo's**, Lovango Cay, St. John: Find peace and quiet here, enjoy great food and watch the awesome sunset.
- 4. Snorkel Watermelon Cay: Enjoy the warm waters or, if you feel energetic, hike to Annaberg ruins, a sugar plantation.
- 5. Experience pizza with a difference: On Great St. James, at Christmas Cove, which is only accessible by boat, you will find floating restaurant Pizza Pi. Don't miss it while on your Virgin Islands yacht charter.

CUSTOMS CLEARANCE

US citizens do not need a passport to enter the US Virgin Islands but will need one for the other Caribbean countries (it must be valid for another six months from date of entry). Visas may be required for citizens from other countries of origin - check with the tourist board.

Due to regulations enforced by BVI authorities, only DYW boats located in the BVI can charter there. Clients not following this rule and entering the BVI on a DYW boats chartered in another Caribbean base like USVI, St Martin, Antigua, etc... will be in breach of contract terms & conditions, & responsible to pay any fine resulting of it.

Download the CBP ROAM app on your smart phone for clearing back into the USVI. A free **login.gov** account is required to use the CBP ROAM app. After opening the CBP ROAM app, tap "Sign In". Guests with foreign passports are usually required to clear customs in person at the Customs and Immigration Office in Cruz Bay, St. John.



INTERNET

There isn't Wi-Fi access at Compass Point Marina and while some yachts have Wi-Fi onboard, it will not work until within range of a cell tower in the BVIs. Add an international package to your cell phone account with your provider so you can hotspot. There is internet access in some cafes and Wi-Fi hotspots, but you may need to pay.

ENVIRONMENT

- Respect your surroundings and leave only footprints in the sand
- Only use the engine or genset when needed (fill up your tanks for the water maker at the docks when you can)
- Recycle your garbage in the correct containers at the marina
- Respect regulations around marine reserves and private islands where disembarking is not permitted

REGULATIONS

The USVIs banned the import, sale and distribution of all sunscreens containing "Toxic Os" (oxybenzone, octinoxate and octocrylene), as they cause harmful bleaching to coral reefs. From January 1, 2020, anyone found using a non-approved sunscreen will be fined \$1,000.

Please note, spray sunscreens are strictly forbidden onboard due to discoloration to the boat over time. Avoid Coppertone products of those with self-tanners or bronzers in as they will damage the boat.

In the USVIs, night sailing is not allowed. We ask you to be settled at a mooring by 5pm. If you are sailing the St. John National Park, please visit the park's <u>website</u> for information and regulations on mooring, anchoring and fishing. For

overnight anchoring or mooring between the hours of 5pm and 7am, there is a self-registration fee. Overnight fees must be paid prior to spending the night at one of the many payment station rafts.

SAILING CONDITIONS

SAILING AREA

Sailing the Virgin Islands is the best way to discover the specific individuality of each island in the USVIs. It puts you in control of your own itinerary so you can make the most of new discoveries, from charming coves, beach parties or bountiful marine life.

The Virgin Islands sailing conditions include easy passages that suit all experience levels, particularly novice sailors. You'll find gentle and near constant winds most of the year, calm seas at 3 to 4 feet and line of sight navigation.

We can help you make the most of your time in the area and during your charter briefing we can show you the natural loop for itinerary planning. Our team are experts and we can make recommendations on what to see and where to dine.

WEATHER

The best time to visit the US Virgin Islands is between December and May when the temperatures are cooler and the winds are steady.

Temperatures in the USVIs range from a normal low of 75°F and high of 82°F. August, September and October are the warmest months with hardly any wind, which makes it feel even hotter. This is the low season when it is less crowded.

The hurricane season is between June and October.

TEMPERATURE

Climate in USVIs:

- Summer high: The August, September and October highs are around 82°F
- Winter low: The December, January and February low is 75°F

WIND SYSTEMS

The US Virgin Islands wind systems include the trade winds season in mid-late December and into early-mid January. The Christmas Winds can make sailing quite the adventure and occasionally shift causing a north swell. We will go through the winds with you during your chart and boat briefing.
